BRAZIL GETS IMMIGRANTS.

RIO JANEIRO, March 19.—The Brazilian Review states that the number of immigrants entering Brazil during 1920 was 94,695, an increase of 26,309, or 36 per cent., over 1917, Brazil being the only country in America which shows an increased immigration during the past year.

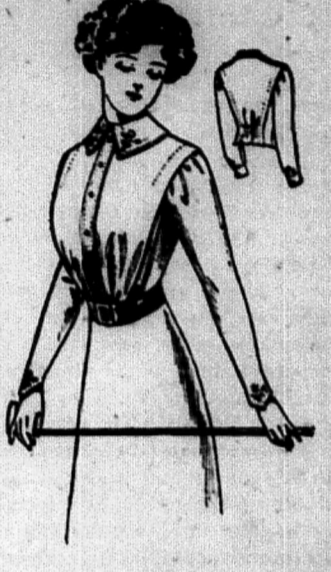
