ABERDEEN, Wash., July 30.—With Abe Muir and his sell-out gang in town, the rank and file of Sawmill and Timber Workers' Union is solidly behind the fight to prevent treachery.

The Plywood Union here has been taken into the Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners, of which Muir is an official. The Joiners' Union is being forced to accept a scab charter.

The strike front is solid and the local Longshoremen are supporting the lumber workers in an effort to maintain the union's strength.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 29.—Rank and file members of the Sawmill and Timber Workers' Union here still are resisting attempts of the operators to smash the union by refusing to fire scabs employed during recent weeks in order to keep up the pretense their mills were operating.

The strike proposal submitted by the lumber barons of five major mills provided for the retention of scabs and would allow the employers to discriminate against union workers.

The employers have refused to reconsider their proposal and have again called upon the traitor, Abe Muir, to help them force the agreement down the throats of the striking lumber workers.

Abe Muir came to their rescue by appointing Bert W. Sleeman, described as an official of the Portland council of the Carpenters and Joiners and long known as a conservative labor leader, to represent the workers in negotiations over the vital issue.

STRIKE STILL ON

SEATTLE, Wash., July 29.—The Sawmill and Timber Workers' Union here this week officially applied to the Unemployed Citizens' League Central Federation for assistance in picketing Seattle mills.

The Unemployed League immediately called upon all jobless whether organized or not, to join the timber strikers on the picket line.

At Aberdeen, Wash., the strike is reported as solid, with but little wavering among the workers. The number of scabs working remains small.

The public at Aberdeen is bitter against the strike-breakers and homes of scabs are being picketed continuously. During the last few days there have been frequent clashes between strikers and scabs.

Recently the passengers of a bus refused to ride unless a scab, taking the same bus, was kicked out.

Scab Loaded Ship,
McKinley, Will Not
Be Worked in S. F.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 30.—The S.S. President McKinley, with a scab cargo from Vancouver is tied up in San Francisco and maritime workers refuse to touch the vessel.

The McKinley crew refused to work the ship at Victoria. She headed for Seattle and then San Francisco. But when the company learned the ship would not be worked here, she was re-routed and went to San Pedro.

At Pedro the workers refused to touch her, so now she is back in San Francisco, laying idle. She will not be worked here as long as the British Columbia dock workers are on strike.

FACING WORLD," PIECK
TELLS DELEGATES

Agenda Is Adopted

BROWDER AND FOSTER ON
PRESIDIUM—STALIN

GIVEN OVATION

MOSCOW, U.S.S.R., July 27.—"Socialism or Fascism is the question confronting mankind today," declared William Pieck in his opening report to the Seventh Congress of the Communist International, which Friday elected a presidium and approved the agenda for its work.

Five continents and nearly every country in the world are represented at the Congress.

Comrade Pieck, representing the Communist Party of Germany, stressed the danger of new imperialist wars which is becoming more pressing every day. Humanity is facing destruction, the wiping out of culture, and new bloody wars through fascism, or the alternative, the freeing of mankind for unexampled progress, prosperity and peace through Socialism, Comrade Pieck said.

Comrade Stalin received a stirring ovation when he mounted the platform in the Hall of Columns where the Congress is meeting. Ernst Thaelmann also was wildly cheered whenever his name was mentioned.

SECOND JACKSON MINER ASKS
FOR I.L.D. TO TAKE HIS CASE

International Labor Defense Attorney
Quietly Has Bail Set for Canales,
Framed Striker Freed on \$1,000

JACKSON, Amador County, Calif., July 29.—Adolph Canales, striking gold miner who has spent the months since February 16 in the rotten Amador County jail, was bailed out last Friday by the International Labor Defense.

On February 16, Canales and James P. Workman, another striker, were arrested and framed on charges of possessing concealed weapons. When they were first arrested the sheriff's deputies searched them and their car, before credible witnesses and found nothing. They were taken to the court house, and the deputies had another little private search of their car and came up with a "concealed weapon."

Workman Chooses I.L.D.
The American Federation of Labor fakers and conducted a purely "legal" defense, and never at any time offered to bail out either of the workers. Workman, wasting away to a pitiable physical condition, became disgusted with this sort of "defense" and asked the International Labor Defense to take his case. He was promptly bailed out. When tried, he was convicted, but is still out on bail, pending appeal.

Canales, impressed by the fakers' "red scare" shifted away from the I.L.D. and left his defense in the hands of the A. F. of L. He was convicted, sentenced to 1 to 5 years in San Quentin. The lawyers won a stay of execution, pending an appeal.

Canales Left in Jail.
But they left him in jail. The A. F. of L. fakers made no move to even have the court set bail for him.

At the time of Workman's trial, I.L.D. attorney George Anderson, who was fighting it, learned that Canales lay in the Amador County jail. Mr. Anderson quietly went to Superior Judge Anthony Cametti, Jr., and asked that bail be set for Canales. "It rests with you," said the trial judge, to set bail," said Mr. Anderson.

The Judge set the bail at 1,000 cash and the I.L.D. raised it.

Finding himself free again, after almost 6 months, Canales promptly asked the I.L.D. to handle his case from now on, together with Attorney George Olshausen, of Sacramento, who has handled other defense work in this strike.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 29.—The California State Conference For Repeal of the Criminal Syndicalism Act has decided to begin a campaign, jointly with the International Labor Defense, for immediate release of the victims of the Sacramento Criminal Syndicalism Trial.

According to present plans of the Executive Committee of the Conference for Repeal, the prisoners themselves will issue a call, from their cells in San Quentin and Tehachapi Women's Prison, for two mass conferences to inaugurate the campaign.

Dates are not yet exact, but one conference will be held in Los Angeles, and another in San Francisco, each to rally the campaign for freedom of the Comrades in its respective territory.

Following these meetings, a statewide conference, representative of the entire state, will be held in Sacramento during the hearings on the appeal of the frame-up case.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 29.—International Labor Defense attorney, Leo Gallagher, has written a letter to Warden Holohan of San Quentin Prison, asking that a group of doctors be allowed to visit the prison and examine Jack Crane.

Comrade Crane, one of those framed and sentenced during the Sacramento Criminal Syndicalism trial, is very ill. Prison doctors have expressed the opinion that a stomach ulcer, with which he suffered before he entered prison, has become irritated seriously by the coarse prison fare.

A stomach specialist has stated he should have a special diet and careful treatment.

Congressman Signs Petition

NEW YORK, July 29.—Thomas A. Amie, U. S. Congressman from Wisconsin has signed the petition, addressed to Governor Talmadge of Georgia, for the freedom of Angelo Herndon. The drive to obtain 2,000,000 signatures on the petition is also backed by Father Divine, who has signed it.

Among other prominent persons signing the petition are Mrs. Eunice Carter, of the Mayor's Committee to Investigate Conditions in Harlem, Wm. H. Davis, Dr. Kelly Miller, Jr., and Mrs. Vivian Mason of the Harlem Home Relief.

SCHARRENBURG REINSTATEMENT VOTED ILLEGAL

SAILORS UNION RANK AND
FILE REPUDIATES EX.
COMMITTEE MOVE

SAN FRANCISCO, July 30.—The attempted reinstatement of Paul Scharrenberg by the I. S. U. Executive Committee was repudiated by the membership of the Sailors Union of the Pacific here last night and the findings of the Committee were declared illegal.

Paul Scharrenberg is through as far as the seamen are concerned.

Another Red-baiting official, Buckmaster, patrolman of the Seattle Branch of the S.U.P., probably will go the way of Scharrenberg soon. The membership here last night instructed that he be notified to appear for trial here this week. A rank and file committee was chosen to hear the charges being brought against him.

Attend Wash. Meet.
Harry Lundberg and Carl Tillman were instructed to take plane today for Washington, D. C., in order to be present at conferences called by Assistant Secretary of Labor McGrady who, along with A. F. of L. officials, shipowners, and other reactionaries is attempting to discredit the rank and file of the West Coast maritime unions.

A letter of protest was ordered sent to the Nazi government of Germany, the U. S. State Department and President Roosevelt regarding the kidnapping by Nazi agents of Edward Walsh, American seaman aboard the S.S. Manhattan and a member of the I. S. U. A committee of ten will take a copy of the protest resolution to the German Consulate here.

Demand Convention.
A motion demanding a Pacific Coast Convention of the I.S.U. to be held in San Francisco on Aug. 15 to propose a new shipping award on September 30, was passed. Previous endorsement of the American Seaman, Red-baiting sheet edited by Carl Lynch here, was withdrawn and a letter will be sent to all advertisers of the paper to the effect that the Voice of the Federation now is the official organ of the S.U.P. here.

Deal of the Ferryboatmen was condemned for his attempts to smash the Bargemen's Strike and a copy of the resolution will be presented to the Central Labor Council at its Friday meeting.

The membership voted to establish a branch of the union in Hawaii at once to send Weisbarth, a Hawaiian seaman to take charge of the branch.

250 Strikers Win
\$5 a Week Raise

NEW YORK, July 30.—The three-week strike of 250 members of the Provision Seamen's Union has been settled. The employers agreed to a closed shop and \$5 a week increase in wages.

"FREE MOONEY" 8,000 DEMAND AT S. F. MEETING

BRIDGES IS GIVEN HUGE
OVATION; KANJU KATO
ONE OF SPEAKERS

Labor Party Stressed

COMMUNIST PARTY, TRADE
UNIONS AND OTHERS
IN UNITED FRONT

SAN FRANCISCO, July 29.—Approximately 8000 persons jammed the Civic Auditorium here Sunday afternoon, the nineteenth anniversary of Tom Mooney's frame-up on charges growing out of the bombing of a Preparedness Day parade in 1916, to demand in no uncertain tones freedom for the world's most famous class war prisoner.

The Communist Party, many trade unions, Epic workers and numerous other organizations were represented in the United Front Committee sponsoring the meeting. It had been called at the request of Tom Mooney whose application for a writ of habeas corpus from the California Supreme Court now is being pushed by his attorneys.

Kato Speaks.
Kanju Kato, Japanese trade union leader, was one of the main speakers at the meeting. He said the Japanese workers are closely tied up with the struggle against another imperialist war.

Lawrence Ross, San Francisco section organizer of the Communist Party, called for a united front of all workers, professionals and liberals in a mass Labor Party which by its united strength would be able to free Tom Mooney. "If necessary," he declared, "Such a Labor Party could call a political general strike to force the employers to grant Mooney's release."

Bridges Cheered.
Harry Bridges, fighting president of the San Francisco local of the International Longshoremen's Association and president of the District Council here of the Maritime Federation, received a mighty ovation as he arose to talk. His reception by the crowd was significant in that it demonstrated conclusively the workers of San Francisco are not being misled by the Red-baiting of the shipowners and corrupt labor bureaucrats of the Joseph Ryan stripe.

"Labor has learned a lesson from these frame-ups never to be forgotten," Bridges said. He enumerated the many frame-ups to which California workers have been subjected and declared labor must strengthen and organize every allied group.

"The time has come," he declared, "when labor and the people should challenge political control of the employers by forging a powerful mass labor party."

Wagner Walks Out.
Assemblyman Charles L. Wagner walked off the platform without delivering his scheduled talk when Leo Gallagher, International Labor Defense attorney, pointed out the role of the labor bureaucrats in sabotaging the fight to free Mooney. Gallagher was backed by the fiery chairman, Casper Bauer who is himself an old time trade unionist. He declared that everything Gallagher had said about corrupt labor leaders is true and that, contrary to Wagner's assertion, Gallagher had not attacked the American Federation of Labor membership.

Telegrams of solidarity were received from George Dimitrov, the International Labor Defense, the Committee for the Defense of Political Prisoners, the Communist Party, U. S. A., Robert Whitaker, Los Angeles minister, and the Criminal Syndicalism Prisoners at San Quentin, the Pen and Hammer Club of Palo Alto telegraphed a \$10 pledge to the defense fund.

ARBITRATION TURNED DOWN BY BARGEMEN

SAILORS PICKET PIER
WITH BARGE STRIKERS;
BOSSSES LOSE MONEY

SAN FRANCISCO, July 30.—San Francisco Bargemen refused even to vote on the question of arbitration of their demands and the Stockton Barge local voted but turned down the proposition.

Meanwhile employers still are running cargo using armed police escort from here to the San Joaquin County line where another convoy takes the trucks on into Stockton.

The employers have been forced to admit the business of running cargo is losing money for them and have made threats to use force in starting once again to operate the river boats.

Confidence Voted.
The Bargemen were given a vote of confidence by the membership of the International Union here at a joint meeting Saturday. Ted Starr, president of the Bargemen spoke at the meeting.

Sailors are picketing at Pier 1 along with the Bargemen, against the scabs being used by Dirty Deal of the Ferryboatmen's Union.

The authorities at radio station KROW here refused to allow the Bargemen's broadcast because the issue is "controversial." But Fay, president of the River Lines against which the Bargemen are striking, it is reported, has been allowed to give the employers' side of the issue through the facilities of another station.

"HEARST ON TRIAL"

I.L.D. TO DEFEND A MAJORITY OF FRAMED EUREKA WORKERS

Leo Gallagher Forces Release of Four on
Own Recognizance—McGowan and
Besig Plot Disruption

Eureka, Calif., July 29.—The trial of fifty-five lumber strikers facing charges of "rioting" growing out of a vicious attack by police upon a picket line at the Holmes-Eureka Mill here June 21, is slated to begin Monday, Aug. 5th.

Workers and sympathizers are urged by the International Labor Defense, defending thirty-three of the framed workers, to show Judge Falk and Assistant District Attorney Bradford with protests at once, in order to halt the machinery of frame-up. Workers and sympathizers living in the vicinity of Eureka should pack the court room on the day of the trial to show the men back of the frame-up their solidarity with the workers on trial.

18 Accept Vigilante.
Eighteen workers, under pressure of a terrific Red-baiting campaign aided and pushed by Ernest Besig, renegade Civil Liberties Union lawyer, accepted Blaine McGowan, prominent vigilante, as their attorney.

Three stated they wished some attorney to be selected later by the ACUL to represent them. District Attorney Bradford offered to dismiss the cases of forty-two of the others who under the law are entitled to be tried in eight separate groups, would agree to a united trial. The offer has been taken under consideration by the workers.

Vigilante Drill.
The Eureka vigilantes are holding three-weekly drill practices. They go through their strike-breaking motions with guns and bayonets. One of the group was heard to say that the drill captain had emphasized "they must be very careful in their drill work because otherwise they may not only endanger themselves but also their fellow drillers." And damage they do, it was pointed out "must be directed toward strikers and other malcontents."

Paul Lampella, who was shot through the eye at the time of the police attack, is still in a very critical condition. At times he is fairly normal, and at other times he is completely delirious and raves insanely. He was nearly well when a violent sneeze dislodged the police bullet which entered through his left eye and lodged in the back of his brain. (Continued on Page 3, Col. 6)

Italians Resist African Service

WORKERS OPPOSITION TO
WAR THREATENS END
OF FASCIST RULE

Wages Fall Steadily

UNEMPLOYMENT AND HIGH
PRICES INCREASE
DISCONTENT

ROME, Italy, July 30.—The twenty-first anniversary of the beginning of the World War finds Rome the focal point for the next war, one of the many threatening the world at this time. For months steady preparations have been going on for the war to begin in the fall, against Ethiopia, when Italian troops will be able to stand the tropical African heat, and the end of the rainy season will make the roads passable.

Negotiations are going on meanwhile to smooth the way for the conquest by Italy of the Negro republic, which materially is no match for the huge Italian war machine, but will have the advantage of fighting in a region naturally inaccessible. In addition Ethiopia will have the support of the workers of the world, led and directed by the Communist Party.

Economic Crisis.
War against Ethiopia has been forced on Mussolini by the deepening economic crisis, and the increasing unrest of the Italian population. The extent of this may be gauged by the fact that wages and salaries, proverbially low in Italy, have fallen 20 per cent in the last year, while prices have risen 15 per cent.

The economic dependence of Italy on foreign trade, and the unfavorable trade balance, plus the growing debt caused by war expenditures, have forced Italy off the gold standard. This means an increase in prices, and a still further falling off in the level of real wages.

Unemployment, in spite of the activity of war industries, and added army conscription, remains officially at a figure of over 7,000,000, which in an agricultural country is an extremely high rate.

Anti-War Sentiment.
Signs of popular dissatisfaction are seen in many organized and unorganized protest actions. Riots against military service, are increasing. On the Austrian borders hundreds of young men are (Continued on Page 3, Col. 5)

A feature of the San Francisco rally will be the showing of the Georgia chain-gang case, an exact replica of the steel-barred "jail on wheels," bunks and all, wherein chain-gang prisoners are transported to and from county jails and road camps. This case is teaching the United States in the interests of the defense of Angelo Herndon, young Negro Communist sentenced to a Georgia chain-gang. The International Labor Defense has just received word it will arrive here in time for the Anti-War demonstration.

Organizations taking part in the Aug. 1 meet are the Machinists, Bargemen, Communist Party, International Labor Defense, the Public Works and Unemployed Union, and others.

RELIEF STRIKES AGAINST WAGE CUTS ON AUG. 7

STATE FEDERATION CALLS
MASS DEMONSTRATIONS

SAN FRANCISCO, July 30.—The State Federation of Unemployed has called for mass demonstrations and one or more hour strikes on relief projects on Aug. 7 throughout the State of California against the coolie wages-scale and union smashing program of Roosevelt as outlined in his proclamation on the New Public Works Program.

In line with the demands agreed upon at the Washington-United Front conference called by the National Unemployed Councils on June 22, the State Federation of Unemployed, and Allied Organizations are demanding:

1—That prevailing trade union wage rates be paid on all projects; that every unemployed worker gets a job who needs one; that weekly and monthly earnings at such rates shall be guaranteed on the basis of a 30-hour week.

2—For adequate cash relief for those not given jobs, and those with large families who receive insufficient wages at prevailing union rates for 30 hours work be supplemented with additional relief.

3—That the right to organize and to recognition of democratically elected committees and to strike shall be specifically and publicly guaranteed.

4—Against forcing unemployed to accept jobs for private employers where union rates of pay and working conditions do not prevail.

All SERA and direct relief workers, trade unionists, and SERA. A professional and office workers are called to join the mass action of Aug. 7. Solidarity of action will defeat the Roosevelt wage-cutting program.

'Relief,' Vigilantes and the Wage-Cutting Program

The return of more than 100,000 California workers to their relief rolls means an immediate wage-cut of 15 per cent in the case of San Francisco and vicinity, and a startling evidence of the hold strike-breaking and wage-cutting program of the Roosevelt administration.

Local relief officials have moved promptly in concert with the employers, laying the blame for an attack on prevailing trade union wage standards when the projects are gradually opened under W.P.A. auspices.

The yellow press has done its part by sheding crocodile tears over the reported "shortage" of employment, and even has the gall to assert that the "enough" longshoremen are available to San Francisco to man the docks.

Not enough "scab" longshoremen, gentlemen of the left press; not enough crop workers will work for starvation wages, perhaps. Too much solid organization among the employed and unemployed workers to permit such shallow and obvious tactics to succeed.

We must stand upon our constitutional rights to talk freely to National Guardsmen on questions affecting the working class, and convince them that they should under no circumstances let themselves be used to shoot down fellow workers on strike demonstrations.

As predicted, here last issue the House of Representatives took the neutrality resolution from the hands of the Senate and altered it before passing it back.

Labor Day, September 2, will not be completely in the hands of the reactionaries this year. Another twelve months of capitalist crisis has brought numerous strike and unemployed struggles, has brought masses of workers by hand and brain into conflict with constituted authority in the shape of police departments, magistrates, and a whole tribe of flag-waving demagogues and professional reactionaries who too often in the past got away with lip-service to labor at election times and on official holiday occasions.

Engels on America

During the Civil War in America he was an ardent supporter of the North against the South because he saw in the struggle of the North a struggle of the masses for the abolition of slavery, a struggle of progressive forces against reaction. Under the leadership of Marx and Engels the Executive Committee of the First International sent a message of greetings to Lincoln. Engels was in continuous correspondence with leaders of the working class movement to his very death.

There was a time when many theoreticians thought that the United States of America was exempt from the laws of social development discovered by Marx and Engels. They thought that America, with its unlimited natural resources, with its skill and energy, with the tremendous accumulation of its wealth, and with the high organization of its business, would be able to avoid the contradictions of capitalism, the antagonism that lead to the overthrow of the entire system and the establishment of the dictatorship of the proletariat and the building of socialism. The last few years have opened the eyes of millions to the fact that "all is not well in the U. S. A." What ails this great and powerful country? Just this—that the mode of appropriation is in irreconcilable conflict with the mode of production, to use the words of Engels. The economic crisis that is destroying this country shows, truly, that the well-organized capitalists of the United States with their powerful state apparatus, are like the sorcerers who cannot dominate the forces conjured up by them. The salvation of the masses of America lies in the way pointed out by Marx and Engels.

FIREMEN FIGHT BUROCRATS ON CONSTITUTION

FAKERS CALL COPS TO RUN UNION MEETS

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—Rank and file members of the Maritime Firemen's Union and Waterfronters' Union of the Gulf and Atlantic Coast won a victory here last week when Judge Aaron Stearns ruled that the new constitution, proposed by the bureaucratic officials, must be held in abeyance until further hearings on September 3.

Five rank and file union men, speaking for many others of the same opinion, had filed an application to enjoin Oscar Carlson, secretary of the union, Ernest Miskind, treasurer, and four trustees from putting into effect the new constitution on the grounds that it was instituted in violation of the old one.

As the hearing opened the attorney for the union officials asked for a postponement. William L. Standard, attorney for the seamen, countered with a demand for an immediate hearing on the grounds that the situation brought about by the new constitution had reached such a point that delay would be dangerous.

Since the new constitution had been declared in effect the officials had on several occasions called police to disperse meetings of the union members. Union meetings had been attended by as many as twenty-four cops.

A clause of the new constitution would permit Oscar Carlson, the secretary, to withdraw union funds over his own signature. The old constitution requires the signatures of the secretary, treasurer and three trustees before any funds could be withdrawn.

The Note to the Soviet Union Was a Deliberate Provocation

Without doubt the "blunt" note sent by the State Department to the Soviet Union, attempting to "blame" the Soviet Government for Communist activities in this country, was inspired by most reactionary aims. It is difficult to believe that even capitalist political leadership is so admittedly bankrupt as to demand that foreign governments suppress revolutionary activity bred by economic conditions at home and carried on by home-made revolutionaries. The only explanation possible is that the State Department was forced by "naive" (Wall Street) fascist pressure to insert a thin, glaring wedge for the breaking off of relations and the beginning of an even more vicious anti-Soviet campaign.

Coming as it does at a time when Italy proceeds on its robber career with the tacit consent of the United States, the "blunt" note is a blunt warning to all opponents of war and fascism that dangerous imperialist measures are in the offing.

We ignore many reasons for characterizing the note as being based on false evidence, and cite merely one—the fact that while the Communist Party is perfectly legal in this country, the Soviet Union is advised to suppress American constitutional rights abroad. Coming from a country that was once proudly an "asylum" for political prisoners, it measures the depth of the fascist, imperialist current of today's capitalist politics.

Locally, the note has been made the occasion for a further attack on Sam Deger, district organizer of the Communist Party. Needless to say, the attack has amounted out of all proportion to the technical offense with which he is charged, an offense which even the local press pointed out would be considered negligible ordinarily. Capitalist tools committing much graver offenses get off free. Forster Walker, freed at Hearst's behest, is a case in point.

The attack on the Soviet Union is a tribute to the illogic of reactionary capitalism, which as Engels long since pointed out, "is the first to violate its own legality"—as, for example, in Santa Rosa, in the violent breaking of strikes and the murder of hundreds of strikers; in the jailing of the Criminal Syndicalism prisoners; in the dozens of vigilante actions countenanced by the police and government office-holders.

He wasn't very big and his chances of getting a man's job at the mine like the boys who were big for their age was minimized by his smallness. He and his mother sometimes discussed this alarming deficiency.

The men and boys called him "Midget," and sometimes a smart aleck would catch him by the back of his overall's strap and haul him around like a suitcase for the amusement of the crowd. She said in a voice that sounded like a man's, "You're so small to worry about that, little man. Now run along and play. We know just how much your mother needs to keep you alive on, and that's all you can have."

"Where you going?" his mother asked like she always did when he opened the rickety door and started out into the morning.

"Just out," he replied like he

always did ever since the mired school house had closed its door due to lack of county funds.

"Don't get near the mine," he called after him. "You might get in trouble now since the men are on strike." She said that too nearly every morning since the strike began.

Billy gazed on the loose boards of the floor stoop and backed over the rough house of unfinished lumber that scattered down the hill toward the mine shaft. Guards were pacing back and forth before the mill with their guns dangling over their arms.

Once he let him cut some wood for a nickel. Maybe he had more wood to cut. He circled the edges of the trail and kept well under the pines watching the cabin from the back way and crept up to it in a small rain wash.

It was very quiet inside. Mr. Mack was alone then. He slipped in through the woodshed and noticed that there was some wood to cut. He peeked through the half-open back door.

He could see Mr. Mack's feet on his bed. He must be asleep yet. Billy pushed the door back a little to make sure. It squeaked. "Who's there?" Mr. Mack called in a strange, stifled voice.

"It's me Billy," he answered apologetically.

"Come in, lad."

Mr. Mack didn't move much. His face was bruised and he had his head tied up with a blood-soaked cloth.

"Give," Billy was eager. Afternoon shadows were just stretching down the slopes and creeping over the wash basins when a much smaller shadow, impossible to see, crept down under the scrub oak and into Mack's back door.

Italian Somaliland Troops Desert to Ethiopia

The World Zionist Congress, meeting in Lucerne, Switzerland, this week and representing 1,300,000 Jewish followers through the world, and the influence they can bring to bear in business, is expected to issue a call for intensified boycott against Nazi pogroms.

The new wave of attacks on Jews in Germany are well known, but the World Congress instead of calling for use of the best weapon with which to fight back organizes a day of fasting and a half holiday of the congress as their protest. Against a Nazi economy which has but a 2 per cent gold reserve to cover its paper money, whose expensive war preparations, unfavorable trade balance, and high commodity prices is bringing increasing discontent of the people, against all this, the best weapon is the economic boycott.

No more effective way could the Congress find for bringing pressure on Hitler than this.

"We have not met here to erect a walling wall before which to recede our wags," says Rabbi Stephen Wise, New York delegate.

Neither, apparently, from reports of the congress, thus far, have they met to take action in defense of their brothers. For Wise recommends as the only real solution for the Hitler pogroms a "national movement in Palestine." And the Congress, ignoring its golden opportunity, fritters itself away with argument on whether or not, in Palestine, the labor party should undertake the enforcement of religious observances. While in Germany their brothers are beaten, imprisoned, murdered.

Italian Negro Troops Desert

Several thousand native troops of Italian Somaliland have shown their answer to the munitions empire which have been in effect against Ethiopia. Fleeing across the border, these Negro troops have brought themselves and their rifles to offer in defense of the last remaining independent Negro country against Fascist marauders.

This is what the imperialist nations most fear—the consequences which the Italian attack will wake among the millions of enslaved Negro workers throughout the colonies and semi-colonial countries throughout the world.

France, depending to a large extent on colonial troops, now is trying to localize the war and jumping first to one side of the fence, then to the other, now indicates that she will not back League of Nations' sanctions against Italy—"because they would tend to spread the war and embroil other countries in a general conflict."

This action would do nothing to localize war. If a unity of all nations against the aggressor could be accomplished, the war would be too costly for Mussolini. But the old, fundamental factor—the imperialist rivalries among major countries—serves to prevent such unity. Actions are determined by ruling classes of imperialist countries mainly on their own interests—and peace may or may not be one of them. The working class alone fights for peace, and in this case the Front Populaire, led by the Communists and Socialists and trade unions and yielding tremendous influence throughout France will be the factor to determine whether France backs Mussolini's attack on Ethiopia or whether Laval's government is forced to join with other nations in outlawing fascist Italy. That such actions will occur, in France, in the next two weeks is obvious.

Reunion in Vienna

In the meantime Hitler is utilizing the present situation to try and reach friendship with Austria while Mussolini is busy elsewhere. While the Italian army goes through its battle maneuvers before 300 members of the fascist parliament and the cabinet, in Vienna Nazi Minister Franz von Papen and Austrian Foreign Minister Berger-Waldenburg conferred and agreed newspapers of both nations "would cease their attacks and put themselves into service for restoration of normal relations."

The past few weeks have seen an intensive series of attacks between the two governments, the Austrian broadcasts being inspired by Mussolini, according to reports. This first step toward reconciliation leads along the path Hitler will try to follow more and more as Italy becomes more involved in her conquest in Africa.
